

Rosene Kotz has been a member artist at the TOTT for several years and describes her arts practice as having developed through a desire to recreate what she sees in everyday life and as a creative outlet to express herself.

As a painter she works with oils, acrylics and mixed media. She is also a photographer delighting in capturing images of South Australia.

The creation of jewellery and sculptural pieces is a new passion and she enjoys working with resin, clay and native quandong stone in the creation of her artworks.

She finds experimenting with new materials inspires her creative process.

Rosene particularly enjoys interacting with visitors to the Gallery when rostered on duty, talking with them about the gallery, the artists and their artworks.

Penny Verco says that her love of drawing goes back as long as she can remember. She spent part of her childhood in England and moved to Australia in 1963 where she contined her passion for art and joined the Salisbury Art Society.

During her working life, her art was enjoyed as a creative outlet when time was available. Later in her career, whilst working in aged care, Penny was delighted to move to a role teaching art to aged care clients, a role that she continued until retiring.

Penny has a private studio and paints using a range of mediums whenever she can.

Over the years she has won a number of awards with her paintings, mainly of animals. She says she likes to have fun along the way as that's what painting is about.

Samantha Kotz says her childhood was filled with exposure to different types of art-making as a result of coming from an artistic family. A gift of a camera opened up photography as a form of expression which has become a lifelong love.

Whilst working as a high school teacher she found experimenting with art the ideal creative outlet.


Sam enrolled at UniSA to study art more formally upon leaving teaching. Her studies have exposed her to a range of disciplines including digital photography, kiln formed glass, printmaking, jewellery, sculpture and ceramics.



Artist of the month - March

Barry Liddicoat

I have always been interested in working with timber, dating back to the days of woodworking lessons in Primary School.

This led me to pursue a carpentry and joinery apprenticeship in the Whyalla shipyard which commenced in 1964.

Beautiful timbers including Queensland maple were used in the making of the furniture for the ship's accommodation which was French polished and then later lacquered.

Around 1993 I became interested in woodturning, possibly as a result of a visit to Tasmania and Victoria and seeing some of the work done by their craftsmen. With a lot of reading and watching of videos and DVD's, I have been able to get a great deal of enjoyment out of making objects which can be functional and sometimes I just enjoy bringing out the beauty of the grain.

I also like to make things which are a bit different and quirky, but still basically in timber.









A taste for adventure

Gallery members Ann and Adrian Beacham, took some time out from their creativity to pursue another couple of their favourite pastimes, travelling and motorcycle riding.

They recently spent two weeks in Nepal where they both rode motorcycles across the country, whilst taking in the sights and culture of Nepal.

The journey began in Kathmandu with a 10 ½ hour bus ride to the regional city of Pokhara, a mere 200 km away.

The constant roadworks and poor road conditions were the cause of the long trip.

They met up with fellow travellers from America and South Africa in preparation for the ride. They rode Royal Enfield Himalayan Motorcycles from Pokhara to Bardia National Park and back via Lumbini.

The highlights of the tour were seeing a Bengal tiger in the wild on a park safari, visiting the birthplace of Buddha (Lumbini) and participating in the Holi festival in Kathmandu. They said "Nepali people are so friendly and welcoming and the kids just melt your heart".

Deciding that "there are too many things to describe about this wonderful nation ", Adrian has blogged the trip with the occasional photo for those who are interested in their travels.

AGSA's Regional Touring Exhibition: Tarnanthi on Tour: Kungka Kunpu (Strong Women)

Touring nationally, 22 Oct 2022 - 16 Jun 2024
From Kungka Kunpu (Strong Women) | NSW Government

Presented as part of AGSA's acclaimed Tarnanthi program, this regional touring exhibition reflects the adaptive genius, energy and dynamism of Anangu culture and recognises the APY art movement as a vital source of contemporary art production in Australia today.

Kungka Kunpu (Strong Women) tells the inspiring tale of women supporting each other across generations, expressed through exemplary paintings, large-scale woven sculptural installations and moving image. These works centre on caring for Country, mapping significant sites and life-sustaining practices of the desert, while also sharing complex narratives surrounding family obligations and relationships. This includes the Kungkarangkalpa (Seven Sisters) story about women who travel together and look after each other.

Kungka Kunpu is currently in Maitland NSW. Here's the schedule for the tour of 5 east coast regions.
