



'Artisans in Autumn' ... so much to see and enjoy!

ANZAC DAY 2023

A report by TOTT Member Malcolm Hermann

The Gumeracha RSL sub branch managed the local commemoration of Anzac Day, with this year's theme being the 70th Anniversary of the cessation of the Korean War (1953) and 50th anniversary of the end of the Vietnam War (1973).

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One (1) serviceman from the district enlisted for the Korean War. He was KIA in 1953 and his nephew attended the service.

20 people served in Vietnam many of whom were able to attend. Those who attended were presented with an inscribed cross and a packet of Anzac biscuits.

In addition to the normal service, a cross and wreaths were laid in memory of Antonio Loiacono, a Birdwood footballer who was tragically killed the previous Saturday while playing against Gumeracha.

About 600 hundred people attended the Gumeracha event, which was followed by breakfast in the Hall provided by the Torrens Valley Lions Club.

Later in the morning, a short memorial service was also held at the Birdwood Arch where 12 wreaths were laid.



- *Three if small, (A4 or less including frame)
- *Two if larger than A4 or
- *One if extra-large (greater than one square metre in total size)

3D works, textiles, pottery etc. items per artist –

* up to seven (This number is negotiable depending on size – please contact Annette)

Exhibition Timetable

Artwork delivery date is by Wednesday 5thth of July – 11am to 4pm.

The entry fee of \$20 is also payable by this date. Artwork must be accompanied by your agreement to exhibit and inventory forms and each item must be individually marked with your name, priced and ready to hang or otherwise display.

The exhibition set up day is Thursday the 6th July
Official opening date is Sunday 9th of July at 2pm
The exhibition concludes on Sunday the 27th August
Artwork is to be collected & signed out by Wednesday 30th of August

Artist of the month - April

Alana Preece



I am fascinated with colour, light. line and space and the way these elements interact with each other on the forms and surfaces of the natural world around me. In particular, the way in which these elements combine to inform us on a subconscious level and the impact this has on our wellbeing.

I grew up in Tasmania in a close relationship with the natural environment and throughout my life elements of the Australian landscape continue to inspire my work. Born with an eye for detail, a keen sense of design and an innate awareness of the spaces around us, I have always been able to 'see' beyond the surface and pieces of life to a 'bigger whole'. This has fueled my lifelong quest as an artist to take the viewer beyond the surface of the work to a quiet place of connection to self (and all of life).

During my 30+ years in Tasmania, my creative output was varied; painting, drawing, ceramics, stained glass and the ever-present tactile process of working with and creation of textiles (sewing, spinning and weaving).

Since developing my professional arts practice my oeuvre has been broad, though largely centred on painting and drawing in all mediums, across all genres (including portraits).

For many years in Adelaide I also painted interior murals in hospitals, special schools, offices, cafes and homes. This work was particularly sought after for its healing/therapeutic qualities. Since 2005 I have been creating unique mosaic mirrors, which have also included many commissions. These mirrors are an extension of my quest to take the viewer beyond the surface of the artwork.

In January 2017 I was introduced to the 'wet felting' technique and immediately began creating nuno felt 'wearable' art pieces (scarves/wraps). These beautiful lightweight, one-of-a-kind pieces are a 3D extension of my decades of painting the Australian landscape combined with my lifelong love of textiles and my belief in the ability of colour and line to affect our psyche and therefore wellbeing.

In these wearable pieces, through a sensitive use of colour and line and a transparency that reveals 'another side' the wearer is wrapped in aspects of landscape, becoming part of the piece.

In 2018 brooches, handmade in polymer clay arose in response to the 'wearable' art scarves/wraps. They too are aspects of landscape, snippets of memory, connection to a bigger picture, other places.

I have been exhibiting my work for many decades and during this time have won many awards and prizes. Over the decades I have completed many commissions, in all mediums and genres in which I have worked. My work is held in public and private collections throughout Australia and overseas.

In 2016 my website (www.alanapreece.com), a comprehensive collection of my work and intent was included in the Australian National Digital Archive (PANDORA), deemed by the State Library of South Australia (in conjunction with the National Library of Australia), as being of "cultural significance and long term research value to ongoing generations".

I work from a home studio in Redwood Park, South Australia





Artist of the month - May

John Ragless

John discovered woodturning upon retirement from a career as a cartographer. Some of the skills developed with the aesthetic aspects in making maps have come to the fore in the timber pieces that John has been creating over the last 10 years.

In his own words John says
"I am a hobbyist 'woody' who accidently
became a woodturner. My wife and son
bought me a lathe for my 60th birthday.
The same year, I joined a great woodturning
club and that was the start of my career as a
woodturning artist.







The bowls and other pieces that I create are both decorative and functional and reflect the colours and textures of the Adelaide Hills. They are made from a variety of different woods and often also feature a variety of glazes, resins or decorative inclusions"

Interwoven Journeys: The Michael Abbott collection of Asian art / Curator:Rusty Kelty

This exhibition celebrates the many remarkable gifts to AGSA from South Australian barrister Michael Abbott, AO KC. In Asia, Abbott developed a fascination for textiles — their materiality, meaning and capacity to carry rich cultural traditions. Interwoven Journeys invites visitors to experience the breadth of South Asian and South East Asian art and includes a focus on Balinese, Sumatran and Javanese textiles, including the world's oldest dated Javanese batik, exhibited for the first time.

Milton Moon: Crafting modernism / Curator: Rebecca Evans

6 May - 6 August 2023 Free exhibition

Explores the life and career of Milton Moon AM (1926–2019), one of the most important Australian potters of the twentieth and early twenty-first centuries. A pioneer of the modernist approach to ceramics in the post-war period, Moon had an enormous impact on Australian art and craft throughout his career as both an artist and educator.

Many of you may have heard of Milton Moon and seen his work. He was born in Queensland but from 1969 lived in Adelaide and lectured at the SA School of Art, retiring to Summertown in 1975 where he had a studio and lived with his wife, Bette Moon. He is such an interesting character and his love of the Australian environment, the craft of ceramics, Zen Buddhism and Japan are reflected in his work.
