

The whys of it all

Following on from a couple of recent discussions I have had with a number of my craft and art friends as to why we belong to an art gallery – it got me thinking...

- why does one join a gallery?
- and, why do we volunteer our time helping with all the tasks required for the running of a cooperative not-for-profit organisation such as Top of the Torrens?

Firstly, the primary reason we join a gallery is to show our creative work to the public and, hopefully sell some work. Belonging to a small regional gallery gets you experience of showing in public.

You get to meet other artists who you can ask for help or feedback. You can observe what works and what doesn't. Who is professional and effective and who isn't. You might get lucky and make a sale, contact, or a new friend.

When you are unknown any recognition and exposure is a good thing!

Secondly, as a volunteer in a co-op art gallery you get to hone your creative skills, gain confidence in yourself, and experience the rewarding feeling of giving back to your gallery.

A co-op gallery works on community membership principles, not profit alone, it helps you learn about costs and logistics.

Working in a co-op art gallery necessarily involves each member artist devoting a fixed number of hours working in the gallery. Each co-op has its shared responsibilities, work hours, and commissions.

The shared managerial skills are the beauty of a co-op art gallery. The co-op members discuss and agree upon every aspect of the group from gathering office supplies, making work schedules, art display space allocation, marketing, even house-keeping. There is no top-down approach in a co-op art gallery, but hands-on sharing with more interaction and co-operation.

Joining a co-op art gallery can be a powerful experience for any artist. But you must be a team player, and a generous one at that, in order to reap the rewards. There is no doubt that arts organisations such as ours would not be able to exist without the support they receive from our members and the community.

I believe there is a real sense of community within our Top of the Torrens Gallery which has resulted in our successful development and operation over many years.



Recently I have completed several commissions of friends' much loved dogs and cats - winning a few prizes in local country shows!

I am constantly learning and have recently worked on painting old stone cottages.

I am willing to take on animal commissions - an example of a Samoyed painting is in the gallery.

Tarnanthi 2023 - 20 Oct 2023 to 21 Jan 2024

AGSA's annual exhibition of contemporary Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander artists from across the continent, *Tarnanthi*, was launched on Thursday 19 October at 6pm.

Tarnanthi means to come forth or appear – like the sun and the first emergence of light - and what a wonderful emergence this exhibition is!

A major feature is the first survey exhibition of acclaimed portraitist **Vincent Namatjira**, whose works offer a wry, satirical Aboriginal perspective on the politics of history, power and leadership. Vincent lives in the APY Lands and is the great-grandson of Albert Namatjira. He too is very talented – although the style is quite different! He was winner of the Ramsay Art Prize in 2019 with his sculpture "Close contact" and an Archibald winner in 2020 in with his painting of footballers Adam Goodes and Nicky Winmar entitled "Stand strong for who you are".

Namatjira's dynamic community of Indulkana is also the source of Tiger Yaltangki's painted adaptions of classic AC/DC rock posters, and Iwantja Arts' 40th anniversary retrospective.

Other desert homelands have inspired Bugai Whyoulter's breathtaking depictions of seasonal changes around Wantili, Spinifex artists' phosphorescent renderings of the power of Wanampi, the Water Serpent, and Warlayirti artists' epic project to reconnect with Wilkinkarra salt lake.

Utopia's former stockmen muster the memory of cattle drives across Country, and the pastoral past informs Kunmanara (Ngilan) Dodd's shelter-like sculpture made from fencing wire and wool.

Denise Brady's paintings are stunning and are accompanied by an audio recording she made to explain their connection to her story. Elizabeth Close's sculptural pieces are created from reclaimed car bodies. From the Pilbara, Nyangulya Katie Nalgood pays tribute to the birds that evoke Country, and Juluwarlu Art Group's video work and carved objects emphasise the power of performance to connect to Country and culture.

From Arnhem Land, Wally Wilfred's vivid contemporary paintings reflect on traditional cycles of life and death, Djakaŋu Yunupiŋu depicts ancestral links to seasonal weather patterns, Injalak weavers celebrate nature's colours in their dyed woven baskets, and Ray Mudjandi unmasks his latest Aboriginal superhero, *Black Speed*.

From Central Australia, Tangentyere and Yarrenyty Arltere artists represent their place through soft sculptures and ceramics. Paintings and soft sculptures also animate Sally M. Mulda's and Marlene Rubuntja's video story of their overlapping lives, (a joy for younger visitors) while Judith Inkamala and Janet Fieldhouse tell their personal stories in ceramics.
